1. Please describe the services / benefits that your organization provides to the community. Are these services / benefits available to the community from another organization or agency?

Island Pathways, is a charitable, non-profit society with 30 years of experience in promoting "Active Transportation" (safe pedestrian and cycling activities) on Salt Spring Island. We are widely recognised as a successful volunteer community group that has already made considerable progress with activities such as:

- installing approx 30 bike racks around the island, creating kilometres of The Ganges Village Pathway Network,
- promoting road-side bike lanes,
- producing both a Hiking Trails map (Salt Spring On Foot) and a Cycling Map which, we are in the process of revamping (Salt Spring On Wheels),
- sponsoring events like Bike To Work Weeks and Velo-Village,
- teaching children about safe cycling and supplying affordable "Helmets for Life" to over 500 student
- and much more.

We are the only organization on Salt Spring that is dedicated to Active Transportation. Almost all our funds are spent on project for the community. We have no staff and little overhead as we pay for no office space.

Our project benefits all of Salt Spring Island, of all age brackets, as well as many tourists who come to our island.

We just celebrated our 30 year anniversary. We have approximately 100 members and 60 volunteers (most of these are on the IP Board, PCP committee and work party volunteer list).

Project / Proposal Profile

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1. Assistance is being requested for:

Project equipment - Kilowatt hour meters (4 to 6), simple bike racks for those business who do not already own one, signage, and electrician support, etc.

2. Please describe the proposal for which you are requesting assistance.

Island Pathways (IP), is hoping to initiate the installation of <u>10 + electric bike (E-Bike) charging</u> outlets around our island and especially in Ganges Village and bicycle destinations. These charging outlets also double as charging locations for electric mobility scooters (legally considered pedestrians), which we are seeing a lot more often used by folks wanting to stay active and independent.

We will be encouraging some participants to put in quad plugs, so up to four bikes can plug into an outlet at one time. We will also be encouraging some partners to install a kilowatt hour meter that can track the usage of the outlet. This can be really helpful to us in the future knowing our success and considering future projects.

All these charging outlet locations will be indicated on IP's new Cycling Map (Salt Spring On Wheels) that we anticipate will be ready for this summer's tourist season. This new map will nicely compliment our Hiking Map (Salt Spring On Foot) we released in 2018.

Providers of an outlet for the use of the cycling public will be on their own to decide where they will place their outlet and to hire their own electrician to have the outlet installed. We have asked that they also provide for a space for a bike to be located (a bike rack would be optimal) near the outlet and if appropriate a space for a mobility scooter..... The cost to the participant will be different depending on the location and difficulty and cost of installing the outlet. Some will already have 110 outlets on the outside of their building, near an existing bike rack. Others will have neither. We hope to provide a small incentive to help all participants with their costs (electrician). Providers are also responsible for the monthly costs of the electricity, which will be minimal but is still an on going expense for them. To fully charge an E-Bike takes about ½ kilowatt hour which would cost approximately 5 cents but most cyclist will not need a full charge, so we are estimating they would pay an average of 3 cents a charge. What we want to track is how many E-Bikes are using the service a month / year and how this changes in the coming years.

3. Please describe how this proposal will benefit the community.

The particular focus of this project is on the encouragement and extended use of electric or electric-assist bicycles (E-Bikes) that allows for easier travel on our hilly road network. The fact that these outlets also assist and encourage electric mobility scooter use, is a bonus. The proposed project promotes the reduction of our Green House Gas (GHG) emissions through encouraging the transition from fossil-fuel drive vehicles to more eco friendly modes of transportation.

The 2011 Climate Action Plan for Salt Spring Island estimates that **on-island transportation** accounts for 36% of our total GHG emissions. Supporting residents and visitors to cycle more often, is one way of lowering our GHG emissions. We know that more and more people are buying electric bikes and more touring companies are using them. We need to make our island electric vehicle friendly in every way we can. Encouraging cycling also encourages a healthy lifestyle.

The current fence which surrounds the garden is constructed of steel posts surrounded by plastic mesh and wire chain link. 95% of the fence is plastic mesh and the remaining 5% is wire chain link. The surrounding mesh is in need of repair.

The garden is situated on Karl Hamson's property where his sheep wander his pasture property including the perimeter of the garden fence line. They are constantly looking for food and will eat any plants or vegetable which grow through the fence. As a result, the sheep have discovered out how to breech the wire mesh by pushing their noses through the plastic, making holes and eating any vegetable or fruit that grow near the perimeter of the fence line.

Each year they are able to make bigger holes or find the spots where repairs are done, sticking their noses in the seams and forcing the mesh open, again. This has made the security of the food increasingly difficult.

Our plan is to replace all of the plastic mess with wire chain link.

3. Please describe how this proposal will benefit the community.

Once the fence is fixed, families can continue to use their gardens without fear of destruction of food or plants. The garden provides education regarding growing your own food and where food comes from. It increases food security for those families who participate. Provides satisfying labour and physical fitness, neighbourhood improvement, a sense of community and a connection to the environment.

NOTES:

Grants/ Funding would be for the replacing the fence and fixing the gate, including supplies and labour. We can afford this project without the funding, but we need contingency funds in case we need to pay for half of the pond pump in an emergency. We have budgeted the revenue as \$1000, but I do think we should apply for \$1500 as a more comfortable cushion in the contingency fund.

Repairs and maintenance and infrastructure/ capital improvements has a budget for \$1450 total to account for a possible increase in costs during the fencing and gate repair projects.

Contingency funds of \$1275.31 will likely barely cover the replacement of the well pump if necessary. However, fingers-crossed that our fencing budget will be \$1000.00 instead of the allotted \$1450.00, leaving us then with approximately \$1700.00, more than enough to cover our half of expenses.

Society fees this year include our annual report filing fee and the transition fees.

The Community Resource Centre is supporting the creation of two bilingual songs in SENCOTEN and English, focused on salmon and the Salish Sea. The songs will be created through the SENCOTEN Tribal School Immersion program. The K-1 & 2 students, will help create song #1, and the grade 3-12 students will help with song #2. Renee Sampson and Pena Elliott of the Immersion program will partner with singer/song writers Holly Arntzen and Kevin Wright of the Artist Response Team (ART) to develop the lyrics melodies and instrumental parts for the songs. These will be woven together with First Nation singing and drumming.

The songs will be a contribution to revitalization of the SENCOTEN language and convey the worldview of the Saanich people "...how we must live on and care for this land and our relatives, the living things around us.

This project will help to continue developing and building ties between the youth and artists of the WSANEC people and the settlers of the Southern Gulf Islands. In addition, it will explore opportunities to develop ongoing workshops and collaborations between the WSENEC and the SGI to encourage cultural tourism and workshops.

The SENCOTEN-English songwriting project will enable all our students from all backgrounds to sing and learn together. This is a simple and powerful tool for building relationships and student capacity for intercultural understanding, learning how the WASANEC peoples respect the land and the sea, and it will put our children and our youth in a leadership role to inspire their families and community to take action to protect watersheds, the ocean and the wild Pacific for the benefit of all.

Mayne/Galiano Bioblitz 2019, May 3-5, 2019 proposal is the result of consultation between the two conservancies over the best method to increase our knowledge of the range, numbers and types of species from all environments to make up our islands and marine waters. We also saw an opportunity to more efficiently share available funds. We foresee inviting up to 20 specialists in fields ranging from marine fishes, marine invertebrates, marine plants, terrestrial plants, mosses and lichens, insects, freshwater organisms, small mammals and so on. These experts will be supported by students, scientists in training and naturalists on the each island. As well, each island will have a central station under tents that will have microscopes, samples and displays by partner groups from around the region. At these stations there will be hands on displays, activities for children, and have scheduled guided walks to special natural areas on each island. The invited guest specialists will be provided accommodation, food and honouraria where appropriate and in turn some will make public presentations on their findings. The logistics planned to date is to have the specialist teams rotate between the islands and target selected key geographic areas or species groups that are gaps in our current knowledge.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2017

1. PURPOSE OF THE SOCIETY

Mayne Island Conservancy Society (the "Society") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated in the Province of British Columbia who is a registered charity exempt from income taxes.

The Society's mission is to educate and promote environmental, ecological and recreational values on Mayne Island, B.C.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the amounts of revenues and expenditures reported during the year. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relate to the determination of the deferred portion of contributions. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Revenue Recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Investment income is unrestricted and recognized as revenue when earned.

Revenue from fundraising and other sales is recognized when the fundraising event takes place and when a sale occurs.

Inventory

Inventory is valued as the lesser of cost and net realizable value.

Measurement of Financial Instruments

The Society initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value.

The Society subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and accounts receivable. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost includes accounts payable.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in net income.

Cash

Cash is defined as cash on hand, cash on deposit, and net of cheques issued and outstanding at the yearend.

The Society's statement of cash flows is prepared on a net cash basis and cash flows from operating activities are reported using the indirect method.

Capital Assets

The Society follows the requirements of Section 4431 of the CPA Canada Handbook with respect to capital assets.

Section 4431 permits not-for-profit organizations with average annual revenues of less than \$500,000 to be excluded from the capitalization and amortization of capital assets.

The Society follows the policy of recording all capital acquisitions as expenditures in the year they are incurred.

Contributed Services

Volunteers contribute their time to assist the Society in carrying out its activities and the Society receives donated inventory to be sold. Due to the difficulty in determining the fair value, the value of the donated services and goods are not recognized in these financial statements.

7. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Society is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis presents the Society's exposures to significant risk as at December 31, 2017.

Credit Risk

The Society is exposed to credit risk with respect to its cash and accounts receivable. The Society assesses, on a continuous basis, accounts receivable on the basis of amounts it is virtually certain to receive based on their net realizable value. Cash is held by a Canadian credit union.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk of being unable to meet cash requirements or fund obligations as they become due. It stems from the possibility of a delay in realizing the fair value of financial instruments.

The Society manages its liquidity risk by constantly monitoring forecasted and actual cash flows and financial liability maturities, and by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash.

Interest Rate Risk

The Society has interest rate risk on its bank accounts. Changes in the bank's prime lending rate or other rates can cause fluctuations in interest payments and cash flows. The Society does not use derivative financial instruments to alter the effects of this risk.

There has been no change in the Society's risk exposure in the above noted risks since the previous period.

8. CAMAS

The external contributions received for the conservation, acquisition, management and stewardship ("CAMAS") of the acquisition of lands and costs associated with establishing binding covenants, has been recorded as a deferred contribution (liability) and is recorded as revenue when the related funds are spent.

During the year, the Society purchased a property (St. John Point) and then immediately transferred the property to the Capital Regional District. As the intention was for the Society to help raise capital for the purchase of the property and to immediately transfer the property to the Capital Regional District, the substance of the transaction was not for the purchase to be a capital asset of the Society, thus the related contributions and costs have been recorded as revenue and expenses to the Society.

8. CAMAS (CONT'D)

As part of the above transaction, the Society registered a covenant on the St. John Point property to ensure that future owners maintain the agreed ecological status of the property.

9. ENDOWMENT FUND

The Mayne Island Conservancy Endowment Fund was established for the purpose of supporting the specific programs of the Society. The Society has set up the Endowment Fund held by the Victoria Foundation which has a market value of \$42,734 [2016 - \$41,107] as at December 31, 2017. The Society does not have access to the capital in the Endowment Fund. The Society is entitled to the interest earned which is paid periodically to the Society.
