Part of the largest set of servicing providing agencies in BC.

- 51 diverse programs spanning prenatal to Elder
- I I 2 staff, term staff and contractors
- 38,000 square feet of programming space
- 86 daycare spaces
- 25 seasonal shelter beds
- 3 apartment blocks plus a foster home
- Ist Friendship Centre public lending library
- New project areas include
 - Property Management and Housing
 - Community Based Participatory Research
 - Victoria Urban Reconciliation Dialogue

Victoria Urban Reconciliation Dialogue

- Completed first year of development
- Core Values: Truth, Justice, Education,
 Decolonization, Sustainability, Inclusivity
- Three (3) Key **Focuses**:
 - Support Urban Indigenous Voice
 - Enable Community Engagement
 - Generate Ideas for Tangible Action
- A grassroots approach where ultimate accountability is to urban Indigenous community and allies

Composition Pool: Community agencies, First Nations, Métis Nation, school districts, police, health authority, post-secondary institutes, all levels of government, and Indigenous community including Elders and youth

Governance

- Hosted by Indigenous Service Agency
- Four levels of non-Indigenous government: federal, provincial, regional and municipal
- Federal and provincial funding supports
- Community representation on Steering Committee through Elders, artists and youth
- Steering Committee mandate
 - Promote collaborative reconciliation in Victoria lead by the urban Indigenous community

Gatherings

- Seven (7) Steering Committee meetings hosted since March 2018
- Two Advisory Panel Gatherings hosted November 26, 2018, and February 25, 2019
- Eighteen (18) Working Group meetings
- Six (6) community presentations: Oak Bay Rotary,
 Fairfield Gonzales Community Association, Public
 Service Agency, Colwood Council Meeting, Metchosin
 Council Meeting, Saanich Council Meeting

Steering Committee

- Steering Committee membership includes representation from:
 - Victoria Native Friendship Centre (VNFC)
 - Métis Nation of Greater Victoria (MNGV)
 - City of Victoria
 - Capital Regional District
 - Indigenous Services Canada
 - Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation
 - Community Elder, Artist/Professor and Youth
- Terms of Reference allow for expansion

Advisory Panel

- 40 people participated in initial Advisory Panel
 Gathering, striving for 80 people for second Gathering
- Invitations are by the Steering Committee but agencies can self-select representation
- The Advisory Panel will:
 - Provide strategic direction on gathering the greater community
 - Direct the creation of meaningful grassroots reconciliation actions
 - Enhance shared linkages among participants

Community


- Term can mean different things
